Its vast 635 acre campus features the 235 acre Cathance River Nature Preserve with miles of maintained trails and the Cathance River Ecology Center. The setting is impressive not only for its natural beauty and gorgeous single family homes but its proximity to the college town of Brunswick. Intellectually and physically engaging activities at Highland Green, the peace of mind of the maintenance program, and the security of a supporting community make it just perfect."

Since moving to Highland Green, Steve has taken full advantage of opportunities. He did not worry about their home when they went on a three week vacation this past winter. He has embarked on a new exercise program in the Highland Green fitness center and, amongst other things, has been named a Distinguished Lecturer at Bowdoin College, his alma mater located just three miles from Highland Green.

Gerald and Barbara Combs from Grand Forks, North Dakota recently made the decision to make Highland Green home. After living in Ithaca, New York for many years where Jerry taught Nutrition Science at Cornell University and Barb had an extensive career in education, they moved to North Dakota 7 years ago where Jerry was named Center Director of the Grand Forks Human Nutrition Research Center of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Barb became an Associate Dean of Education at the University of North Dakota.





"When talking about eventual retirement from our careers, we decided not to focus on when we would move, but where," says Jerry. While considering many areas of the country over the last three years, including Ithaca, New York, Burlington, Vermont, Brunswick and Portland, Maine, Highland Green in Topsham, Maine and even Arkansas, amongst others, Jerry applied his background as a research scientist. He created a side by side comparison of financial factors and distances to cultural and service amenities nearby these places. Highland Green came out on top. "I am sure that I am as familiar as anyone with Highland Green and the greater Midcoast area via Google Earth," remarks Jerry. The research was not strictly scientific however. The general ambience natural beauty of and community Highland Green and throughout at coastal Maine factored in esoterically.

"When you think of trees and history and quirky restaurants and geography and scenery and proximity to other interesting places and inexpensive lobster, Midcoast Maine cannot be beat," says Jerry. The marketing of a new 8 lot cul-desac neighborhood at the highest elevation in Highland Green, abutting the Heath Preserve and just across from the Cathance River Nature Preserve piqued the Combs interest. The opportunity to be part of this exciting new area called Red Maple Drive at Highland Green was enticing. "From there we were drawn into a vortex of decision making which we entered gladly," says Jerry. The Combs were the first to make a pre-construction deposit on Red Maple which allows them to lock in their plan now, help Highland Green build this neighborhood, and to move in either late 2014 or early 2015 as their plans unfold.

Having made the initial commitment, the Combs made a whirlwind visit to Highland Green from North Dakota in late March to visit Bob and Pat Allen's custom home which is the basis for the Combs' new design. During the rest of the day, they met with the site engineer at Red Maple Drive, met with the Highland Green builder, the design coordinator, a representative from Bath Savings Bank who provides special construction financing, and their plan continued to come together seamlessly. The Combs participation in the design process melds their experience in building their own homes with the skill of the dynamic Highland Green team to create a familiar Highland

Green style completely unique to them.

Most significantly, the day ended with a gathering with future and current Highland Green residents at Deke and Nancy Smith's home on Heron Drive followed by dinner at the Wild Duck Pub. Combs spoke expressively, ending with this: "I really appreciate the opportunity to meet all of you. The rest is just numbers and sticks and bricks and plans. Those can always be figured out."


The love of the water

In many respects, Highland Green is located at the epicenter of all things that anyone who loves of Maine waters might desire. Right at the center of Highland Green is the Heath Preserve, a wetland held in a conservation trust that is a well known walking and birding area. The Cathance River runs through the 235 acre Cathance River Nature Preserve at Highland Green with trails along its edge affording views of spectacular falls and wide meandering stretches.

The Cathance River empties into Merrymeeting Bay, which is in Highland Green's "backyard" and is at the heart of an internationally renowned watershed through which 40 percent of all water flowing through Maine travels before emptying into the Atlantic Ocean. This bay is home to plentiful wildlife and plant life, including wild rice, bald eagles, osprey, heron and harbor seals.

Eventually, the many rivers surrounding Highland Green and Merrymeeting Bay empty into Casco Bay, which stretches from Harpswell to Cape Elizabeth, includes Portland Harbor and is home to 136 different islands. It is a legendary boater's paradise.

In the larger context, Casco Bay is just one part of the celebrated Maine coast, all easily accessible from Highland Green.

While the coast of Maine is roughly 228 miles long "as the crow flies," it boasts 3,478 miles of coastline on the Atlantic. Its countless islands, bays, coves, stretches, reaches and peninsulas offer endless scenic possibilities onshore and off for those so inclined.

The greater Highland Green area is a canoeist or kayaker's dream with countless opportunities in close proximity.

Lew and Mary Brown who moved to Highland Green from Boothbay Harbor, Maine in 2011 were instrumental in the creation of the Highland Green Paddler's Guide. As lifelong paddlers Lew and Mary reviewed several safe and accessible areas right nearby. The guide can easily be downloaded from the Highland Green website or a printed version can be obtained from the marketing office.

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Low maintenance living and lifelong learning

An active lifestyle at Highland Green includes the opportunity to "turn the key and go" and to have less worry about such things as lawn maintenance and snow removal. There is even a schedule "check-in" program provided by Highland Green Management. All homes are equipped with monitored fire protection and low temperature sensors near the high efficiency natural gas furnaces.

Jerry and Gretchen Davis both graduated from Bates College in Maine and lived in New Jersey, Virginia and Connecticut while Jerry worked in marketing and sales for the paper industry and Gretchen served as an elementary school teacher. After they retired, they returned to Maine and lived in a waterfront condominium in Portland. They enjoyed their view and the low-maintenance aspect of condo living which allowed them to more easily pursue their passions: travel and education. One thing that was missing was a strong sense of community.

The Davises moved to Highland Green in 2009 mainly to be around other people with similar interests and have since embraced being interactively engaged in many ways with their fellow residents. "The people are just terrific," says Jerry. Life at Highland Green is further enhanced for the Davises as they enjoy the low-maintenance benefits while having a custom built freestanding home abutting the Cathance River Nature Preserve. It is rare to see them out without Jerry, an avid birder, having his binoculars handy.

One of Jerry and Gretchen's passions outside of Highland Green is Road Scholar, a non-profit educational and

travel organization with which the Davises have been involved for over 15 years and with which they have been on well over 60 trips. They have learned about tropical ecosystems in Costa Rica, been birding in Belize, voyaged down the Danube and Rhine rivers, ventured across the Australian Outback and attended the Palm Spring International Film Festival each year, amongst many other adventures.

"The educational process is the most important part for us. Visiting new locations, meeting new people, there is no other organization like it. It's one of the centerpieces of our lives," says Gretchen. The Davises also give back to Road Scholar as ambassadors, spreading the word through presentations.

On Saturday May 18 Road Scholar will be incorporated into a very special Highland Green Open House celebrating active lifestyle within and outside Highland Green. New friends, guests and residents will gather at the Community Center, the Davises will speak about Road Scholar, custom homes will be available for viewing, and Highland Green staff will be on site to answer questions. Renowned Road Scholar instructor Jim Millinger will also be on hand to speak about Midcoast Maine.

Jim Millinger was born in Maine, captained ferries in Maine's Casco Bay, was educated at Princeton, Berkeley and Yale, and served as a naval officer. He has also taught Chinese History and Maritime History at many colleges around the country. 
